## Snow Reminders and Information

With the eventual return of snow, Tipp City residents are reminded of the following guidelines regarding snow and ice removal. The Street Department asks residents to use the following guidelines for a safe winter season.

- If the City experiences a snow or ice storm, citizens should remove all vehicles from the street to allow for more efficient snow plowing.
- Please do not blow or shovel snow into the street.
- Trash cans and recycling bins should be placed in the curb lawn as not to interfere with snow removal.
- It is the citizen's responsibility to clear snow from the sidewalk and in front of their mailbox. It is not possible to clear these areas with snow plows.

In the interest of clearing streets in a manner maintaining safety/service vehicle traffic and public travel, **the following schedule will be completed by snow removal crews for plowing and/or salting:**

# Year in Review

The 2018 year has ended with much being accomplished. On behalf of the City Council and Administration, we would like to thank you for your support in 2018 and continued support in 2019.

There have been many projects accomplished this year such as, the replacement of the Maple Hill Bridge has, volunteers have stepped up to address the feral cat situation in the City and start a trap, neuter, and return program at no cost to the residents, a citizens committee was formed to study the need for Quiet Zones at the multiple railroad crossings within the City.

The following projects are moving forward: Parks Master Plan update (thank you to those that responded to the survey), Casey's General Store at the corner of CR25A and Donn Davis Way is expected to open in April, site work for the new water tower will begin shortly with the clearing of the site and the foundation starting in the spring. Various industries are looking to expand and/or locate in Tipp City and there are three active subdivisions.

Council has been working with the Township Trustees in extending water and sewer to township residents. Extending utilities to township residents is premised upon having the capacity in the system to do so. City Council adopted the 5-year Capital Improvement Plan and the 2019 budget. In

 addition, Council approved upgrades to Sub-station #1 to meet the current and future electrical power needs of Tipp City residents, businesses, and industries. The Electric Department is changing 4 KVA transformers over to 12 KVA, which are less costly and more efficient. With the constant reduction in State financial assistance, Council approved the reorganization of various departments in an effort to keep expenditures and revenues in balance by contracting engineering services and reallocating job duties to other departments. This resulted in the reallocation of \$160,000 for other purposes. Council continues to keep spending in line with revenues.

In 2019, Council will be forming the Capital Improvement Committee. This committee will be tasked to review capital projects for the next ten years beginning in 2020/2021. Major projects should be completed by the end of 2020/2021. Maintenance will continue on street paving, ditch cleaning, storm water improvements, park improvements, etc. From the City Staff and Council please let us know of any concern you may and have a happy and prosperous New Year. ●
